## MARGINALIA

One of the oldest organizations in the business of offering summer courses in Italy is the Vergilian Society (Inc.) of America, and since your secretary treasurer is one of its trustees, he will purloin a bit of space to sing its praises. The Vergilian Society's base in Italy is a villa on the site of ancient CUMAE, built in 1912 by the Archaeological Institute of STUTTGART, which intended to excavate there, and in fact, did work for one season in the Samnite-Roman forum before the 1914-1918 war broke out. In the twenties and thirties, the villa was used again as an excavation house when Professor Amedeo MAIURI was clearing the ancient acropolis, uncovering, among other things, the "Sybil's Grotto."

But since 1953, the Villa has been the Vergilian Society's base, and though the Vergilian Society has branched into tours of Germany, Greece and North Africa, its summer sessions in the Naples area are still standard fare. The chief sites, incidentally, survived the earthquake of Nov. 23, 1980, handily. The Executive Secretary of the Vergilian Society is Professor Robert J. One of the books that arrived in the mail lately has been F. W. WALBANK's THE HELLENISTIC WORLD, which is a very able survey of the period from Alexander the Great's accession to what Profes-. sor WALBANK calls euphemistically "The Coming of Rome." It devotes as much space to social, economic and cultural history--and the history of science and technology--as it does to political history, and the majority of the books cited in the bibliography belong to the last three decades, which is a barometer of the present research interests of ancient historians. One could recommend it without a qualm to an undergraduate class, except for the price. The volume, modestly bound in orange cloth, published by HARVESTER Press in the United Kingdom and by HUMANITIES PRESS, Inc. (Atlantic Highlands, N.J., 07716) in the United States, costs \$42.75.

Fortunately, however, the book is also available in paperback as part of the Fontana History of the Ancient World series, edited by Osw yn MURRAY. The paperback is available for Can.\$6.95 from William Collins and Sons, 100 Lesmill Rd., Don Mills, Ont., Canada, M3B 2T5, or for £2.95 (plus 12 p. handling charge) from Fontana Paperbacks, Box 29, Douglas, Isle of Man, U.K. I have not been able to find the U.S. distributor of the paperback: perhaps some readers can enlighten me.
