CALL FOR PAPERS: The 2002 annual meeting of the Association of Ancient Historians will be hosted by Georgia Southern University and held in Savannah, Georgia, April 25-28, 2002. The meeting will also be the opportunity to honor Professor Susan Treggiari on the occasion of her recent retirement from Stanford University. A panel has been organized in her honor. URBANISM, COLONY AND EMPIRE

In his panegyric to Rome of 150, Aelius Aristides returns again and again to the theme of urbanism—the failure of the classical polis, contrasted with the greatness of Rome itself and the civic life the empire fostered. From Fustel de Coulanges and Max Weber to today, classical historians and archaeologists have advanced our understanding of the ancient world as an urban culture, a world of cities.

We therefore invite papers on all aspects of ancient urbanism, from studies of specific locations to broader questions of urban model and theory, including such topics as administration, city foundations, civic euergetism, municipal institutions, city planning, urban archaeology, and all other aspects of ancient urban life. We are particularly interested in papers that connect mother city to colony and empire to province, whether in respect to culture, economy, government, or architecture. We anticipate two or three sessions on urbanism; papers may be on any period of Greek or Roman history.

The interests of this meeting are not limited to urbanism, and we strongly encourage papers on all other aspects of ancient history, for which a session or sessions will be provided.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR PRESIDENT

Nominations are now in order for the office of President of the AAH for the 3-year term 2002-2005. The current President, Richard Talbert, is eligible for reelection for a second term.

Nominations must be signed by three AAH members from different institutions (different campuses of the same system are considered different institutions) and counter-signed by the nominee to indicate willingness to serve.

Nominations must be received by the Secretary-Treasurer no later than **April 10**, **2002**.

POSITIONS AVAILABLE

KENYON COLLEGE, Joint Appointment in Classics, The Integrated Program In Humane Studies (IPHS). Kenyon College seeks to make a joint appointment in Classics (which at Kenyon includes Ancient History) and The Integrated Program In Humane Studies (IPHS). This is a tenure-track position with an initial appointment of three years, beginning July 1, 2002. The primary research interest of applicants should be Ancient Greek and/or Roman History, and the successful applicant will be competent to teach Greek and Latin languages at all levels. Through 2006, the position will entail teaching half-time in Classics and half-time in IPHS' yearlong Odyssey of the West course. This is a wide-ranging, textually oriented course involving works and authors ranging from classical antiquity through the modern period. After 2006, the position will be full-time in Classics. Interest in such related fields as mythology, archaeology, religion, philosophy, gender studies, or another specialty would be welcome. Applicants should hold the Ph.D. by June, 2002 and be able to document effectiveness as a teacher. The teaching load is 3:2. CONFERENCE OF INTEREST

THE 26TH COMPARATIVE DRAMA CONFERENCE. Call for Papers Deadline December 1, 2001. Papers reporting on new research and developments in any aspect of drama are invited for the 26th Comparative Drama Conference that will take place at The Ohio State University, April 25-27, 2002. Papers may be comparative across disciplines, periods or nationalities; and may deal with any issue in dramatic theory, criticism, and literature, or any method of historiography, translation, or production. Papers should be 15 minutes in length and should be accessible to a multi-disciplinary audience. Scholars and artists in all languages and literatures are invited to email (but not as an attached file) a 400-word abstract (with paper title, author's name, institutional affiliation, and postal address at top left) to Dr. Stratos Constantinidis at constantinidis.1@osu.edu by December 1, 2001. Attendance is expected of all those whose abstracts are accepted for presentation. Abstracts will be printed in the conference program. The Comparative Drama Conference is an international, interdisciplinary conference and draws participants from both the Humanities and the Arts. Papers selected for presentation are assigned to a session of the conference including other papers with related themes. Sessions are established to cover all papers selected. Pre-organized panels will also be considered. A preorganized panel should include three papers. Each paper should be 15 minutes in length. Panel proposals should include (1) a copy of each panelist's 400-word abstract with paper title, author's name, institutional affiliation, postal address, and e-mail address at top left; and (2) a succinct, 50-word rationale for the grouping of the papers (with the name, institutional affiliation, postal address, and email address of the panel organizer at top left). The panel organizer should email the abstracts and rationale to constantinidis.1@osu.edu by December 1, 2001.

AAH-AHA PANEL AT 2002 MEETING

Continuing the tradition of maintaining an AAH presence at the annual meeting of the AHA, the Association will once again co-sponsor a panel at the annual AHA meeting in San Francisco. The panel has been organized by Michael Meckler of the Ohio State University and will be on the topic "Classical Antiquity and the United States Senate."

FELLOWSHIPS OFFERED

School of Historical Studies, Institute for Advanced Study

The Institute for Advanced Study, School of Historical Studies supports scholarship in all fields of historical research, but is concerned principally with the history of western and near eastern civilization, with particular emphasis upon Greek and Roman civilization, the history of Europe, Islamic culture, the history of modern international relations, and the history of art. In addition to these fields, in the academic year 2002/3 the School will support three Members in the East Asian Studies, including linguistics, translation studies, cultural history, and the emergence of East Asian vernaculars. Qualified candidates of any nationality are invited to apply for memberships. Apart from residence in Princeton during term time, the only obligation of Members is to pursue their own research. If they wish, however, Members may participate in seminars and meetings both within the Institute and at nearby universities, and there are ample opportunities for contacts with other scholars. Approximately forty Members are appointed for either one or two terms each year. The Ph.D. (or equivalent) and substantial publications are required of all candidates at the time of application. Member awards are funded by the Institute for Advanced Study or by other sources, including among others the National Endowment for the Humanities whose support will enable three U.S. citizens to take up full-year memberships, and the Thyssen Foundation which will support two German citizens. APPLICATION may be made for one or two terms (September to December, January to April). NICHOLAS GEOFFREY LEMPRIERE HAMMOND (1907-2001)

Students of Classical Antiquity everywhere were saddened to learn of the death of N.G.L. Hammond on 24 March of this year near his home in Cambridge. Scholars know Hammond as the author or co-author of some 20 monographs, editor of several volumes of the *Cambridge Ancient History* and of the 2nd edition of the *Oxford Classical Dictionary*, and author of over 130 articles and commentaries in a writing career that lasted more than 70 years. The modern Greek nation mourns him as a military hero who, as a British liaison officer working in Occupied Greece during World War II, skillfully organized Greek Resistance factions (who were often mutually hostile) against the German occupation. In the post-war period, along with his friend and colleague, the late Charles F. Edson of the University of Wisconsin, Hammond almost single-handedly invented the field of ancient Macedonian studies, his pioneering work in history and historical geography now enormously complemented by important archaeological discoveries in northern Greece.

It is that very charm which served him so well during his difficult war-time service that endeared him to many members of the Association of Ancient Historians. He became a familiar figure at our annual meetings, having given papers on at least two occasions, and he maintained an active correspondence and friendship with many of our members. No one who spent time in his company will forget his warmth and good humor. During "retirement" from his professorship at Bristol University nearly 30 years ago, he spent considerable time as a lecturer and visiting professor at American universities, where he generously shared his knowledge and experiences with students and faculty.

Finally, a personal note In recent years Nick Hammond and I agreed on virtually no aspect of the history and archaeology of ancient Macedonia. But that condition never interfered with a friendship that saw us as guests in each other's homes, as companions in the field in Greece, in Pennsylvania, Texas, Cambridgeshire, Melbourne, and on our long walk across the fields above Boulder virtually to the foot of the Flatirons during the memorable AAH meetings of 1978. His was a career worthy of emulation, in which grace matched scholarship.

THOMAS WIEDEMANN (1950-2001)

Professor of Latin at the University of Nottingham, died of cancer on 28 June 2001, aged fifty-one. He was an inspiring teacher and a scholar of exceptionally wide-ranging interests. Wiedemann's family history was moulded by the turmoil of 20^{th} century German politics. His paternal grandmother was Jewish, and numerous relatives suffered exile or death at the hands of the Nazis. Wiedemann's father survived conscription into a Nazi slave-labour organization and emigrated to England in 1953, where he found work with the German service of the BBC. Wiedemann grew up in a cosmopolitan environment in north London, and always remained deeply conscious of his mixed Catholic and Jewish, German and English background.

After undergraduate and graduate studies at Oxford and at the Warburg Institute, Wiedemann took up a post at the University of Bristol, where he remained until his move to Nottingham in 1995. Both at Bristol and at Nottingham he taught a very wide range of courses, on Roman political and social history, Latin literature, late antiquity, historiography ancient and modern, and classical reception. He also became a prolific publisher, with much of his writing fuelled by his teaching. His publications included two prizewinning monographs, Adults and Children in the Roman Empire (1989) and Emperors and Gladiators (1992), two invaluable sourcebooks, Greek and Roman Slavery (1981) and The Roman Household (1991, with Jane Gardner), an edition of Cicero, De legibus I (1987, with Niall Rudd), and two introductory studies, The Julio-Claudian Emperors (1989) and Cicero and the End of the Roman Republic (1994), as well as many shorter works. His final illness prevented him from completing a monograph on the Roman consilium. At Nottingham Wiedemann fulfilled a long-held ambition by establishing the International Centre for the History of Slavery (ICHOS), with the characteristic aim of fostering the exchange of information and ideas on the study of slavery between academics working in different institutions, fields and traditions. It was among his greatest regrets that he was struck down just when this initiative was coming to full fruition.

Wiedemann formed a world-wide network of friendships. He held several visiting professorships in Germany, and traveled widely, including recent visits to the Madison meeting of the AAH as well as to Washington and Yale. He leaves a wife, Margaret, and two sons, Richard and Benedict.

Many have expressed a wish to contribute to a fund in Wiedemann's memory for the support of postgraduate study of the ancient world at UK universities and in particular of travel by postgraduate students to and between those universities. A fund has therefore been established, to be known as The Thomas Wiedemann Memorial Fund. Those who wish to contribute to the fund are invited to send their donations to Dr J. W.
