The Indigo, a smaller and more modern hotel, is offering a rate of \$179/night (available Wednesday through Sunday); it is located close to FSU's campus, the stadium, and an area with shops and restaurants. If your travel plans allow, we encourage you to make your reservations as soon as possible – the hotels will fill up!

Presidential Update

Members were informed in the Winter Newsletter that current president Georgia Tsouvala's term is ending at the April Annual Meeting, so nominations were solicited. President Tsouvala received more than the requisite number of nominations for a second term, and no other members were nominated. Therefore, following the AAH constitution, President Tsouvala will be declared president for a second term. Because the AAH constitution limits officers to two terms, the office of president will be open at the Annual Meeting in 2026.

Secretary and Treasurer Update

Looking ahead to 2024, both Secretary Brian Messner and Treasurer Scott Perry will conclude their second terms, and following the AAH constitution, they will be ineligible for a third term. Members are encouraged to consider volunteering for a three-year term to serve the AAH in these important offices.

ANNUAL JOINT LECTURE SERIES: Call for Papers for the 2023 Inaugural Lectures

The AAH and the Mommsen Society welcome half-page abstracts for their inaugural joint lecture series to take place annually in the second half of October. A representative of the Mommsen Society and a representative of the AAH will each give a 20–30 minute talk. Both presentations will be in English. The event will take place virtually. Each paper will be followed by a 15-minute discussion.

Three AAH officers and three Mommsen Society board members will function as the selection and organizing committee for this event. The papers to be presented will be chosen by the selection committee in a joint virtual meeting in mid-June. Successful candidates will be notified no later than June 30, 2023.
